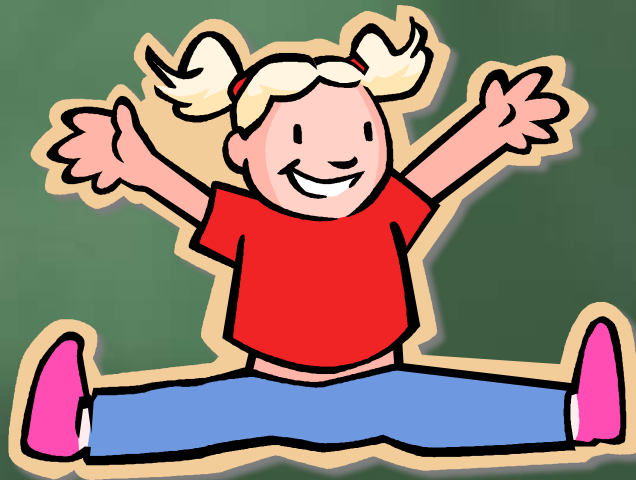


What is an Interjection?

- An interjection is a word that expresses a sudden, strong feeling such as **surprise**, **pain**, or **pleasure**.

Punctuating Interjections

- If an interjection is spoken calmly, simply put a comma after it and continue the sentence. For example:
 - **Shhh**, the baby is sleeping.
 - **Oh my**, I dropped my pencil.

Punctuating Interjections

- If an interjection is spoken with more emotion, it is followed by an exclamation point. The next word is then capitalized. For example:
 - **Ouch!** I just cut my finger.
 - **Wow!** That boat is big!
