




Phrasal verb

Look



# LOOK AFTER (SOMEONE OR SOMETHING)

**Meaning: to take care of.**

I have to **look after** my sick grandmother.



# LOOK FOR (SOMEONE OR SOMETHING)

**Meaning: to search for something or someone**

**I'm looking for a red dress for the wedding.**



# LOOK INTO (SOMETHING)

**Meaning: to investigate or examine.**

We are going to **look into** the price of snowboards today.



# LOOK OUT

**Meaning: to be careful**

**Look out!** That car's going to hit you!



# LOOK THROUGH

**Meaning:** to examine something, usually quickly

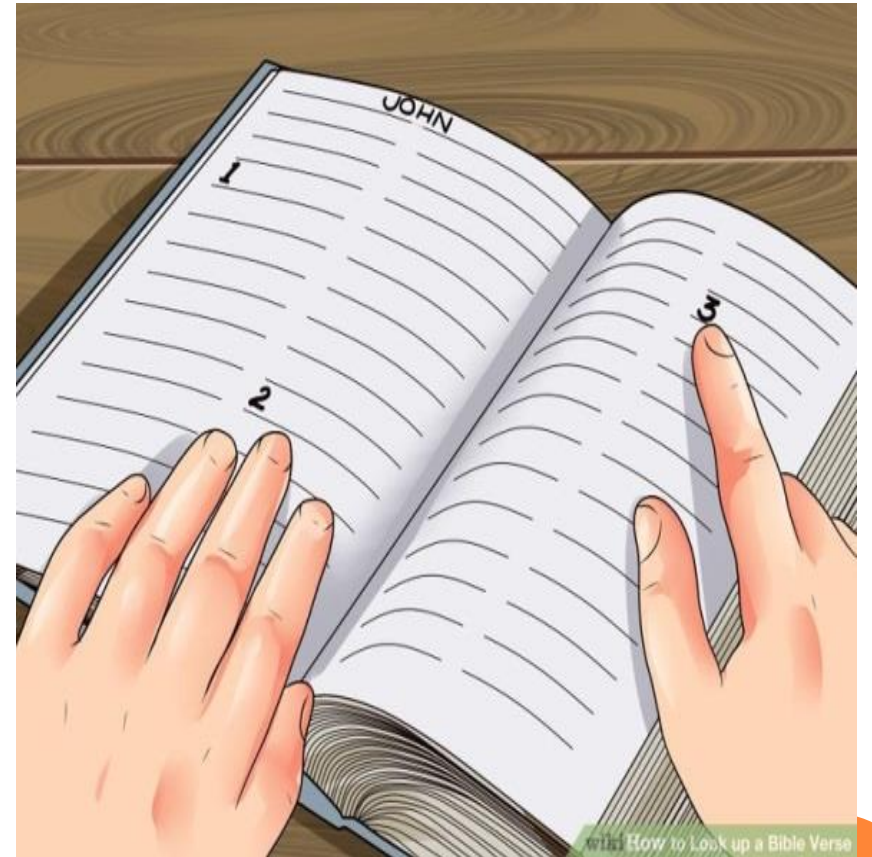
I've **looked through** some catalogues.



# LOOK UP

**Meaning:** to search for information (usually in a book and dictionary)

If you don't know what the word means, **look it up** in a dictionary.



# LOOK UP TO

**Meaning:** to respect or admire someone

I really **look up to** my father.





# LOOK FORWARD TO SOMETHING

## Meaning:

to feel pleased and excited about something that is going to happen

I'm really **looking forward to** my holiday
