What is a figure of speech?

A figure of speech is a phrase or word having different meanings than its literal meanings.


It conveys meaning by identifying or comparing one thing to another.

WHY DO WE USE FIGURES OF SPEECH?

Figurative language uses figures of speech to be more effective, persuasive, and impactful.

Figures of speech help readers make a strong connection to and have a better understanding of the words.

What is a simile?



IT MAKES A COMPARISON

IT USES TWO THINGS THAT ARE NOT ALIKE

IT USES THE WORDS "LIKE" OR "AS"

Example of Simile



Slow like a snail



Brave as a lion



Sleep like a baby



Dry as a bone

- That box is as light as a feather.
- My dad is as strong as an ox.
- My uncle is as blind as a bat.
- After school, he was as free as a bird.

DEFINITION OF A METAPHOR

IT MAKES A DIRECT COMPARISON

IT USES TWO THINGS THAT ARE NOT ALIKE

IT DOES NOT USE "LIKE" OR "AS"
