Personification


Personification is the term used to describe the giving of human characteristics and emotions to inanimate /that is non-living/objects.



Example: The tree smiled as it basked in the sun.

Personification:

Personification is a type of figurative language that can be found in poems, songs, and stories. Authors use personification to help their readers picture something more vividly.



Examples:

- The kettle whistled happily as it boiled.



- My alarm clock yells at me to get out of bed every morning.



- The car danced across the icy road.



- The moon watched me all night.

Hyperbole

Hyperbole is /overstated/ exaggeration used for effect and not to be taken literally.

Example: I'm so hungry that I could eat a horse.



Examples:

- This homework is going to take years!
- I'm so tired I could sleep a year!
- He's got tons of money.
